You just need a piece of paper. If your answer is correct, you will give yourself one point. If your answer is not correct, you will mark nothing on your paper. There are two parts to the test. You will listen to examples. Each example will only be given once. You will answer BEFORE I give the right answer, and mark a point if your answer is correct.

PART 1 (Total Points: 20)

Example No. 1 (Points: 4)

I say: I can have done it. You say: I can't have done it. I say: I could have done it. You say: I couldn't have done it.

Now you go on in the same way.

I could have done it. I couldn't have done it. I should have done it. I shouldn't have done it. I may have done it. I may not have done it. I might have done it. I might not have done it.

Example No. 2 (Points: 4)

Now, I will give the affirmative and your will give the interrogative form. Listen to the examples.

I say: He can have done it.	I say: He could have done it.
You say: Can he have done it?	You say: Could he have done it?

Now you go on in the same way

He could have done it. Could he have done it? He should have done it. Should he have done it?

He may have done it. May he have done it? He might have done it. Might he have done it?

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Example No. 3 (Points: 6)

I will give a sentence in the affirmative, and you will say the sentence as a question. Listen to the example:

I say: I have been studying English for three years. You say: Have you been studying English for three years?

Now you go on in the same way.

I have found what I was looking for. Have you found what you were looking for? He has decided to study philosophy. Has he decided to study philosophy? They have been living here for ten years. Have they been living here for ten years? She has been looking for a new job. Has she been looking for a new job? They had finished when the test was over. Had they finished when the test was over? He had left the house when the fire started. Had he left the house when the fire started?

You say: I need you to come with me.

I say: Come with me.

Example No. 4 (Points: 4)

Listen to the examples:

I say: Help me. You say: I need you to help me.

Now you go on in the same way.

Look at this	Turn on the computer
I need you to look at this.	I need you to turn on the computer.
Try this	Read this.
I need you to try this.	I need you to read this.

Example No. 5 (Points: 2)

Listen to the examples:

I say: Don't you need me to turn on the machine?I say: TheyThen I say: HeYou say: Don't they need me toYou say: Doesn't he need me to turn on the machine?turn on the machine?

Now you go on in the same way. Be sure to speak before I give the right answer.

Don't you need me to turn on the machine?	She
They	Doesn't she need me to turn on
Don't they need me to turn on the machine?	the machine?
